Take The Pulse of Your Chapter with Your Strategic Plan!

As executive boards are meeting and plans are made for the upcoming year, now might be a good time to check the pulse and effectiveness of your chapter. Updating or developing your Chapter Strategic Plan, especially in the areas of Membership, Communication, Program, Leadership, and Technology is a good place to begin. What changes can be made to move forward, to strengthen and maintain a healthy chapter? Your Chapter

Strategic Plan can provide structure and steps in your planning process. To write or to update a strategic plan, as a chapter:

- Determine what members want to see happen what is the desired result? ٠
- ٠ Set a goal or goals to move the group in the desired direction
- Based on those goals, determine strategies or specific actions that will move the chapter toward the goals ٠
- Name the individuals who will assume responsibility for assuring the chapter carries out the proposed ۲ actions
- Determine how and when the chapter will evaluate movement toward the designated goals
- If needed, modify the original goal and strategy or determine new goals and strategies, repeating the planning process from the beginning with those newly identified goals and strategies

This will take some time, deep thought, and discussion! Develop a solid plan, and then tackle the goals with energy and enthusiasm. Make it a group effort. If modifications are needed, don't give up. Keep taking steps forward, and don't forget to evaluate your progress as specified in your action plan. The chapter will become stronger and healthier. Please let me know if I can help!

The Need and Order of an Agenda for a Meeting



Having an agenda for the meeting is perhaps the most important tool to ensure a productive meeting. An agenda lets attendees know what issues are going to be discussed and eliminates guesswork as to whether a particular issue will be brought up. An agenda can focus participants, giving them a written reminder of what needs to be accomplished during the meeting, which allows them to help drive the discussion toward a conclusion.

Although the order of business in an agenda may be any sequence, Robert's Rules of Order specifies an order of business that flows from one item of business to another. This customary order of business has the following subdivisions: (1.) Approval of Minutes, (2.) Reports of Officers, Boards, and Standing Committees, (3.) Reports of Special Committees, (4.) Special Orders, (5.) Unfinished Business, (6.) New Business. The pneumonic MRS SUN helps to remember this sequence. Sometimes an agenda might include a formality at the beginning, such as the pledge to the flag, or a roll call. The agenda does not include "Call to Order," this should be done by the chair but is not part of the order of business.

In the Fall of 2023, the name of the foundation was changed from DKGMIEF to AIM Educational Foundation, Inc. The name has been chosen in order to honor the original name of the DKG Michigan state organization – Alpha Iota. It is a 501 (c) (3) corporation and contributions to its funds are fully tax-deductible.

The AIM Educational Foundation, Inc. supports Michigan women educators at any stage in their career by offering scholarships and grants to college students pursuing a degree in education, mid-career educators, and retired educators who are either engaged in a life-long learning program or pursuing their professional interests. It will host professional seminars on a variety of subjects related to leadership and education.

To be able to fulfill these purposes, we need your help. Be among the first donors to support this worthy cause! You may donate individually or as a chapter. There are three levels of donation and recognition: Become a Founder! Donate \$500 or more by March 31, 2025. Your name will live in perpetuity and will always be listed. You may continue to give at this level after March 31, 2025. Donors at the \$500 level of giving will be called Ambassadors. Donors who give \$100 - \$499 will be Innovators and those who give \$50 -\$99 will be Motivators.

Opportunities for Scholarships and Grants



Are you working on a graduate degree, retraining, or seeking an additional endorsement on your teaching certificate? Perhaps you should consider applying for a Delta Kappa Gamma Michigan Scholarship or an International award.

The International Lucile Cornetet Award is granted to employed educators for the purpose of participating in professional seminars, workshops, and other nondegree programs that relate to an educator's professional aspirations. However, it does not fund participation in DKG-

sponsored programs. The Cornetet Award is granted **two times per year**: May 1 and November 1. This application is available online at the International website at *dkg.org*. You can apply up to **six** months ahead. Awards vary and will pay registration, travel, meals, etc.

DKG Michigan offers scholarships for educators who are working on a graduate degree, retraining, or an additional endorsement in education. Scholarship applications need to be submitted by *March 1st*. A plan of study and proof of acceptance at a college/university is required.

Two \$1,000 scholarships, two \$500 scholarships for retraining or additional endorsements, and one \$800 scholarship for graduate study may be awarded at the Spring Convention. Forms and information are on the DKG Michigan website: *dkgmichigan.org*.


